From then on, Emma has remained adamant that, if handled compassionately, death can be a beautiful thing.

However, as someone facing life-long mental health struggles - nothing out of place in a mental health epidemic being faced by veterinarians worldwide - Emma now meditates on the sense of compassion she offers herself.

Ultimately, Emma's story explores how her upbringing and unique view on death has given her hope in the work she performs, and the life she lives; bringing to light our very human need to offer compassion to others and ourselves.





DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

As The Leash Comes Loose began as a shared fascination with Emma's career as a veterinary euthanasia specialist, and the unique struggles faced in such an emotionally strenuous line of work.

However, as the shoot began, the film found itself operating at a deeper emotional level than anticipated, surveying not just the compassion Emma brings to the traditionally pragmatic field of vet care, but also her own struggles with self-compassion and her journey to pioneer a positive view of death.

This dichotomy ultimately became the heart of our fascination for the project, the seemingly opposed themes of compassion and death. As we spent more time with Emma, these two ideas slowly coalesced before us, something we became excited to display on screen: Emma's view that death can be a beautiful thing.

Emma's story is truly inspiring and hopeful. We were grateful to have had the chance to immortalize Emma's story and wisdom onscreen in such an intimate way, sharing in her quest to shift our world's perspective on death and self-compassion.
